Canadian Foothills

July 30 - November 30, 2014

Canadian Foothills, paintings by artist Denise Lemaster will be exhibited from July 30 to November 30, 2014. The paintings will then travel to The Nicolaysen Art Museum in Casper, Wyoming for exhibition Jan. 30 - May 17, 2015. This American debut of the Canadian artist's paintings will be commemorated with a 20-page exhibition catalog.

This is the museum's first exhibition of work by an artist from outside the U.S. The Nicolaysen Art Museum and Bone Creek Museum have joined together to tell Lemaster's story through art that reflects the natural landscape and celebrates agrarian life.

Canadian Foothills captures a variety of terrain in the mountains and plains surrounding Calgary, British Columbia.

Lemaster paints the landscape of Canada with reverence. She hopes that people will remain connected to the land by enjoying and conserving the natural landscape. Through painting she celebrates the beauty of Canada's wild land and glorifies it without leaving her own footprint.

The artist constantly learns and experiments with neutral to bright colors and light. By furthering her art through en plein air (painting outdoors) Lemaster creates a sense of immediacy and connection to the natural world.

The Nebraska Arts Council, a state agency, has supported this program through its matching grants program funded by the Nebraska Legislature, the National Endowment for the Arts and the

Nebraska Cultural Endowment.

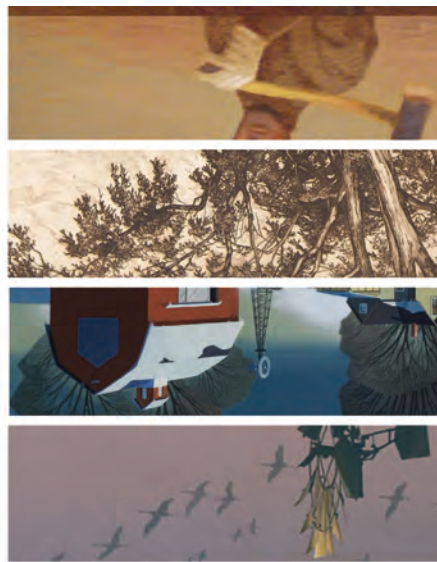

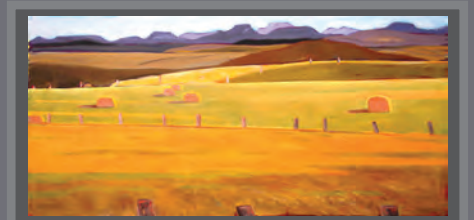
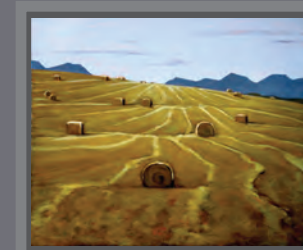

The museum is now seeking funds of \$13,000 from various corporate and individual sponsors to match a portion of the grants it has received.

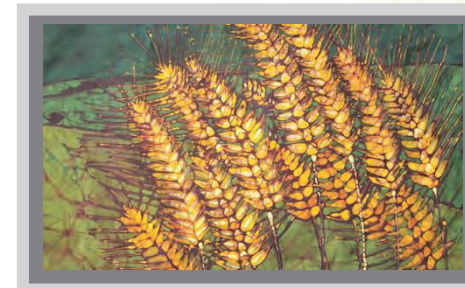

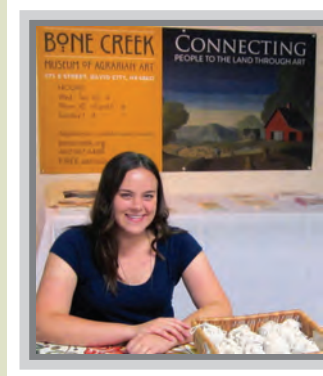


PRAIRIE GRASS PORTRAITS

Kristine Allphin Brakenhoff will discuss her fine art batik at a reception at Bone Creek Museum Thursday, August 14 at 5:30 pm. Brakenhoff has been working in fine art batik since 2011. "It didn't take long to realize these prairie grasses, like the river, were the perfect subject to be expressed in this unpredictable medium of batik," said Kristine. *Prairie Grass Portraits* is on display at Bone Creek Museum through November 2.



Elise Ross and I recently had the pleasure of being in David City to conduct a workshop on prairie plants with local 4-H members and local citizens. We discussed prairie ecology, the value of prairie and how prairie plants can be utilized in the planted landscape. We studied native prairie plants -Big Bluestem, Switchgrass, Indiangrass and prairie wildflowers - Prairie Clover, Purple Coneflower, Leadplant, and Ironweed. We evaluated an area behind Bone Creek Museum for a possible future prairie garden. At the end of the day, we enjoyed viewing the incredible artwork in the museum. - Justin Evertson, Nebraska Statewide Arboretum

DALE NICHOLS CORNER

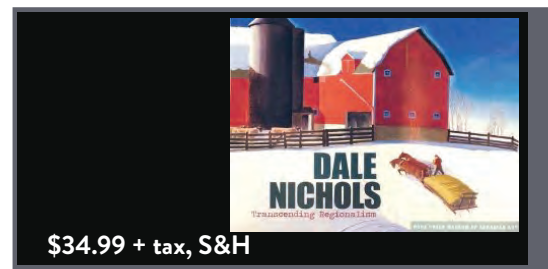


Dale Nichols' paintings were influenced by fond memories of his childhood on the farm in Nebraska.

"Farm life was all I knew for the first 20 years of my life. In painting these canvases, I felt again the vastness of endless skies, experienced again the penetrating cold of Nebraska winters, lived again as farmers live ...in spirit, I am very much a farmer," Nichols said.
