Regionalist Works of Grant Reynard and Reverence for the Rural

This season two art exhibitions at Bone Creek Museum are dedicated to Regionalism, a realist movement of the 1930s and 40s which countered the Modernist avant-garde styles from Europe and New York.

Regionalist Works of Grant Reynard will be on loan to Bone Creek Museum from Museum of Nebraska Art in Kearney from November 3 through March 1, 2015.

Grant Tyson Reynard was born in 1887 in Grand Island, Nebraska. He moved to New Jersey in 1914 to become a freelance illustrator, attending the Harvey Dunn School of Illustration. In the 1950s Reynard's focus began to shift from illustration to his own creative work. Reynard returned to Nebraska almost every summer to conduct lectures and art classes.

Reverence for the Rural -- December 3 through May 3, 2015-- features works of Dale Nichols and other Regionalist works from the Bone Creek Museum permanent collection. This exhibition presents a dozen works of art that convey nostalgia for farming methods of the past and the way many still make their living cultivating the land.


Included in this exhibition along with prints from the Big Four are painters and printmakers who depicted their home places and experiences of the Midwest.

Dale Nichols' (1904-1995) work is the cornerstone artist of the Bone Creek Museum collection. He was the fourth most

famous Regionalist painter after the Big Three: Grant Wood, Thomas Hart Benton, and John Steuart Curry. In 1940, an Illinois newspaper called the group the Big Four with Nichols listed among the other well-known artists. Grant Wood and the other Regionalist artists advocated for direct representation of experiences that were distinctly American. These artists gained immediate fame through award winning paintings like Wood's *American Gothic*.



Bone Creek Museum's mission is connecting people to the land through art. Regionalism is at the heart of the agrarian theme.



One could summarize the concept of *Ballad of The Farm: Then, Now, Tomorrow* as visualizing the invisible. 

DALE NICHOLS CORNER



Did you know that Dale Nichols first traveled to Alaska while in his 20s? He was inspired by a journey made by artist Rockwell Kent. (1882 - 1971) Nichols, like Kent, often found inspiration in the stark beauty of wilderness. While in his 70s, Nichols lived and painted in Alaska. Nichols was inspired by Kent's series of land and seascapes from often forbidding locales like Alaska. Kent wrote, "I don't want petty self-expression. I want the elemental, infinite thing; I want to paint the rhythm of eternity." Nichols created several prints from his time in Alaska like this print below.
